Happy New Year! New Year's resolutions are making news. Our council has approved the construction of a new columbarium in the coming year. My regrets for the morbidity of this news, but I hope funeral planning will become a resolution for some in our church. Funeral talk is not cheery. Nevertheless, having a plan is a kind gift for surviving family and friends. Grief and stress are mitigated when advance directives are in place.

In the coming year, 48 burial spaces (niches) in our new columbarium will be made available for purchase. *Armento Incorporated*, a premier manufacturer in Buffalo, NY, has been awarded the contract. They constructed our first columbarium and will provide us an exact replica to be located on the chancel's south wall. Our two columbariums will face each other.

Details will be provided soon about purchasing a niche. Please contact the church office if you're interested in reserving a space. Questions can be emailed to mtleboluth@aol.com or directed to the church office by phone (412-563-0300). Some find comfort having a sanctuary as their resting place. The reposing saints in our chancel are a continual witness to faith in Christ. Joseph of Arimathea assumed responsibility for Jesus' body following his death. Cremation was a widespread practice in the early church and it's now a growing trend. Many cite financial and environmental reasons for choosing cremation.

The niches in our first columbarium sold quickly years ago. Plans changed over time for some who decided to sell their spaces to others. Please think about funeral planning as a New Year's resolution. Survivors are blessed by decisions made in advance. Stress is compounded following sudden death when plans are not in place.

God bless everyone in the New Year. We cherish all the saints at rest in our sanctuary or in other locations. Thanks to our council and to David Haines for assisting in our new columbarium plans.

In-Person Sunday Morning Liturgy at Mt. Lebanon United Lutheran Church

Updated November 29, 2021

As we continue to hold Sunday morning liturgy in our building, we are taking great care to worship in a safe, responsible manner. While constant vigilance is needed by all considering COVID-19 variants that have emerged, we will continue to safely congregate to praise and worship the Lord in person. Virtual worship and telephone worship will continue to be available for those unable to join in person.

Prior to Worship in our Sanctuary

Wellness: We encourage all to be vaccinated and get the booster vaccine when you are eligible. This includes both COVID-19 and flu vaccines.

Entrances: There will be three locations to enter the church building:Front Door leading into the Narthex from the Governor's Drive (Washington Rd.)Side Door on the north driveway near the Handicap Parking spacesRear Door accessible from the parking lot behind the Christian Education wing.

All other doors will be locked from the outside to reduce internal traffic into areas of the building that would then need to be sanitized.

Facemasks are required for all individuals while in the building regardless of vaccination status. Masks must cover the nose and mouth. Individuals are asked to supply their own masks or coverings. (One-time use masks will be available at the rear entrance and in the Narthex should one forget their mask.)

Social Distancing should be practiced by everyone. All worshippers should continue to use good judgment regarding social distancing and safe health practices.

Offering Plates will be positioned near the entrances to the worship space. Please place your offering in the plate as you walk to a designated pew. You are also invited to use the my E-offering link at <u>www.MtLebanonLutheran.org</u>.

Bulletins will be positioned on tables near the entrance to the nave (next to the Offering Plates) for your use. Please pick up your bulletin, take it with you to the pew, and take the bulletin home with you at the conclusion of the Liturgy. (The events and other information may be referenced during the week!)

During Worship

Pews: Worshippers are encouraged to maintain social distancing during liturgies as much as possible. Please sit in designated pews and respect the ribbons that identify which pews are available for seating and social distancing.

Worship: Music, Hymns, and Anthems will be led by the choir or appointed leaders from the Chancel. Singing in the pews will be allowed with face coverings in place.

Holy Communion will be celebrated at each liturgy. Follow the special procedures that have been established for the safe distribution of the Eucharist. Pastor will wear a mask. NEW GUIDELINE: Please do not remove face coverings until after receiving the host and wine AND moving beyond the tables on either side of the center aisle.

At the Conclusion of Worship

Maintain Social Distancing as you leave the building. It is important to minimize the potential for exposure.

Fellowship in the Narthex will be held near the doors to allow for additional air circulation. Greet fellow worshipers at safe distances from one another. Individual beverages and packaged treats will be available, and masks should be removed only when eating or drinking

Wrappers will be recycled as a demonstration of our environmental stewardship.

Due to reduced coffee consumption, please consider supporting the Coffee Project of Lutheran World Relief during this time.


Virtual Worship (online and via telephone)

Feast of Epiphany Devotions– Live Facebook Thursday January 6 7:30 PM





Epiphany is a season *out of sorts*. To many Christians in the West, the feast from which the Epiphany

weeks are named seems something like a misplaced Christmas. Popular piety and more than one Christmas Eve worship has placed the Magi at the manger beside the shepherds [and in many South Hills' front yards as well!]

The Season of Christmas lasts just two weeks! And when it ends, and like children who have opened all their presents, we're not sure what to do next! Is the excitement over? Do we go back to what we had been doing a few weeks ago?

The Season of Epiphany is a time for rejoicing in the light that shines in our darkness, the light that reveals both our sin and the One who has come to forgive it.

The major feature of the Christian Epiphany is that it provides an affirmation that whatever disclosures of the ultimate might come among us, the essence of God's disclosure in and through Jesus lays bare both the complexity of our own existence and the wonder of God's being.

As the Magi travel to Bethlehem, the proclamation is that the Christ child is born for the whole world. The identity of the travelers from the East remains a mystery, but they were Gentiles.

They found the one they sought not among the powerful or even comfortable. The one sent to reveal God to the nations came by means of an oppressed people and was greeted by foreigners.

The message of Epiphany is clear, light shines not only in darkness, but God acts through the *un*likely to touch the lives of the *ex*cluded.

And this theme continues throughout the Epiphany Season starting with Jesus' baptism at the River Jordan; God in man made manifest to all of creation. It continues until the final Sunday of the Epiphany Season, the Festival of the Transfiguration of our Lord [February 27], on which the revelation comes even to those who persistently misunderstood it.

The Baptism of Our Lord Sunday, January 9th

The teachers of the early church emphasized Jesus' baptism, seeing it as a revelation of Jesus' divine sonship, the anointing and appointment of Jesus to his messianic office at the beginning of his public ministry, a declaration of Jesus' solidarity with the sinful human race in undergoing baptism by John, and a baptism of the water to give the element power to cleanse from sin. [Philip Pfatteicher; Commentary on the Lutheran Book of Worship, Augsburg Fortress, p. 217.]

The Baptism of our Lord, always celebrated the First Sunday after the Epiphany, is an expression of the joy of the Epiphany of our Lord. In fact it serves as a further "manifestation" of the identity of Jesus.

Along with the Easter Vigil and Pentecost, this festival day is one of the traditional times of the church for baptism, because of its symbolic nature.



1 New Year's Day Ask God to ground our resolutions and ventures in the promise that, through Christ, we will live in grace and freedom, knowing we are not alone in our endeavors.

2 Give thanks that, through Jesus Christ, we perceive God's grace, truth, creative might and will for humankind.

3 Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month Throughout this month, pray for those victimized by human trafficking, which disproportionately affects women and girls. Pray for an end to this global tragedy, and pray that all who suffer its abuse, injustice and oppression will find freedom, healing, support and safety, especially in our communities of faith.

4 Ask God to bless the studies, service and travel of college and university students involved in "J-Term" experiences. Pray that they will grow in faith, wisdom, knowledge and understanding of the world, and that their experiences will inspire their vocational discernment.

5 Praise God for attending to the needs of humanity through us, utilizing our diverse gifts and generosity to serve our neighbors in need, everywhere.

6 Ask the Spirit to make us bright lights in our communities and world, sharing the good news of healing and hope in Jesus Christ and demonstrating God's unbiased love through our actions, words and influence.

7 Thank and praise God for restoring our relationships as children of God, so that we can live with faith, hope and freedom as new creations and siblings in Christ.

8 After a two-year pause during the COVID-19 pandemic, the ELCA's Young Adults in Global Mission program is getting ready to send volunteers out into the world again. Pray that the Spirit will guide the prayerful reflection of young adults as they discern how to respond to God's call to service and ministry with our global companions and churches.

9 Pray that everything we do during our baptismal journey in this world will point to God, who has redeemed us and redirected our lives through the birth, life, suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus — our Savior, teacher, guide and friend.

10 Continue to pray for healing and unity in our nation, and ask God to draw us closer to our neighbors, especially those we perceive as different or opposed to our perspectives, beliefs or values. Pray that we will grow in understanding and respect for one another and will work together for the well-being of our communities and neighbors in need.

11 Give thanks to God for our companions and partners in ministry, especially the Lutheran World Federation, World Council of Churches, National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA, Lutheran Ecumenical and Inter-Religious Relations Network, and our full communion partners.

12 Give thanks for the daily, life-giving work of the Spirit, which creates, strengthens and sustains our devotion to Jesus Christ. Pray that the Spirit will renew us and empower us to live as people of faith, gathered and equipped to love and serve our neighbor, bear hope into the world and share the gospel with all people.

13 Join our global companion churches in prayers of thanksgiving and hope for the scholarship awardees of ELCA International Women Leaders, which supports the education of women around the world through seminars, south-to-south exchanges, in-country study programs, and degree programs at ELCA colleges and universities.

14 Praise God, who is mighty and eternal, the creator of all that exists and the source of our blessings and strength.

15 Pray for our neighbors who are struggling with or recovering from COVID-19, discovering the long-term effects that will impact their lives or grieving the loss of friends or loved ones. Continue to pray for the wellbeing and renewal of health care workers dedicated to serving others in times of illness and vulnerability. **16** By turning water into wine during the wedding at Cana, Jesus taught us how deeply God is engaged in every aspect of our human life — our joys, worries, celebrations, problems and sorrows. Praise God for knowing us so well!

17 Martin Luther King Jr. Day Remember in prayer the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and his bold work, ministry, vision and sacrifice, which revealed all people to be children of God deserving respect, opportunity, equality and freedom from unjust laws. Ask God's help in righting the injustices that continue in our nation and throughout the world; pray for the wisdom, humility, courage and persistence needed to welcome all people into our church, society and institutions.

18 Week of Prayer for Christian Unity Throughout this week, pray with our siblings in Christ from diverse cultures, traditions and confessions around the world for the unity of the church, so that, together, we will shine a bright light of hope, healing and good news on our troubled world.

19 Give thanks for the variety of gifts manifest among our siblings in Christ and for the unity we have in Jesus, which enables us to accomplish together much more than we could on our own.

20 Thank God for our special relationship with the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), a full communion partner with the ELCA since 1997. Pray for the church, its members and its leaders, that together we will find new strength and resources for the work of sharing the gospel and serving our neighbor, especially in these challenging times.

21 "How precious is your steadfast love, O God! All people may take refuge in the shadow of your wings" (Psalm 36:7). Thank God for surrounding us with love and mercy on which we can rely.

22 Pray that the Spirit will inspire and lead people to respond to God's call to service through ELCA Global Mission as it seeks missionaries, volunteers and interns to walk alongside our global companions.

23 Give thanks that Jesus is our true Savior, light and hope — the Son of God, who lived among us and continues to dwell with us through the Spirit.

24 January is when outdoor ministry leaders begin recruiting staff for our summer camps. Pray that the Spirit will inspire young adults to respond to the call to serve in our outdoor ministries across the country and to share their faith and enthusiasm with campers of all ages, backgrounds and abilities. 25 Ask God to help us understand that force, vengeance, wealth disparity and dominance over others are inconsistent with God's justice and power, and that these are revealed to us through Jesus' life and teaching, which exemplify humility, compassion, generosity, service, love without prejudice and advocacy for neighbors in need.

26 Rejoice and give thanks to God for uniting us in the body of Christ, which welcomes our diverse gifts, experiences, questions, complexities, ethnicities and cultures.

27 Pray for victims of violence and their families, that God will ease their pain, suffering and grief; pray for those who commit murder or other acts of violence, that God's grace will transform their hearts and lives.

28 Pray for our leaders and congregations, which create opportunities for us to study Scripture, share our questions and thoughts in conversation, and affirm one another's gifts for living the gospel, serving our neighbor and growing the church.

29 Pray for the ministry and impact of Lutheran Services in America, a nationwide network of 300 Lutheran social ministry organizations that serve 6 million people each year, using the gifts and skills of 250,000 paid staff and 150,000 volunteers.

30 Pray that our faith and confidence in Christ will embolden us to be public bearers of good news, hope and wholeness for all people, even in the face of intimidating challenges, criticism or skepticism.

31 Pray that the Spirit will help us understand and practice the qualities of love that God has shown us and that the apostle Paul commends to members of the church in Corinth: "Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth" (1 Corinthians 13:4-6).
