Do not worry, saying, 'What will we eat, drink, or wear?' For it is the Gentiles who strive for all these things; and indeed your heavenly Father knows that you need them. But strive first for the kingdom of God...

Matthew 6:31-33

One of my first sins was stealing. I was four or five, standing in line with my mother at Fatur's Market in my hometown. Candy was in plain view at my eye level. Repeatedly my mother replied, "No," to my requests for a lollipop. 'Grab and go' was my next move. I sprinted from the store with a lolly in hand, jumped into the car and savored the flavor...for about 3 seconds.

My mother was fast behind me. She retrieved the lolly and marched me to the store manager's office. She paid for the candy and instructed me to apologize. Tearfully, I did; then she dropped the lollipop into a nearby trash can.

Boys become men. Russian President Vladimir Putin has lately lined his mighty army at the border of Ukraine. He's prepared to take what is not his own--the sovereignty, resources, and freedom of a neighboring nation. The world is watching. His mother was a factory worker; his father military. I know nothing more about them or the Putin family values.

Jesus addresses human anxiety in the above Bible passage. We worry about what we'll eat, drink, and wear. Some worry more than others. Leaders worry for their nations and become diabolical when they take by force what is not their own. Jesus says, "it is the Gentiles who strive for all these things."

The value Jesus proposes is to *strive first for the kingdom of God*. Part of what this means is that God is first before nation, political party; money, gender, ethnicity, race, sexual orientation; and anything we elevate to inordinate heights. God is first before lollipops and the desire to have them. When I apologized, the store manager forgave me. So did my mother, but she didn't permit me to keep the lolly. There were consequences.

2022 has barely begun. The world is at the brink of war. Some things will never change, but Christ can change our lives. He taught his followers to *seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness*. May keeping God first inform everything we do today, tomorrow, and always. Life is a gift to share together.

WHEN DOES CATECHISM BEGIN?

Reversing the Trend

Congregations have different catechism requirements. Program length and rigor vary. There are differences in the grade level and ages of students. Nothing said below is directed specifically to current students and families in our catechism program. Rather, the concerns are based on decades of ministry and shared with the hope of reform.

Catechism begins the day a child is born. Parents learn this truth when they meet with pastors for baptismal instruction. They learn the duties of Christian parents include more than letters, numbers; diapers; and vaccinations. Teaching faith in Christ is the vow parents make on the occasion of their child's baptism.

Teaching faith includes...

- Ongoing modeling and instruction in the home: Praying before meals; praying before bedtime; reading and teaching Bible stories (Do children see Bibles in plain view in the home and their parents reading God's word?)
- Remembering the Sabbath and keeping it holy: One of the greatest, noticeable changes of the last century has been the decline in weekly church attendance. Decline is evident in Europe, North America, but not in every part of the world. Children learn the habits of their parents. Parents who worship weekly are more likely to have children who do the same in life. There's no guarantee. Children may reject their parents' way. This truth, however, remains: parents pull the sled; they set the course of family life.
- Sunday School Attendance: "Perfect Sunday School Attendance" pins were once awarded at the end of each Sunday School year. Most churches no longer follow this practice. Few pins could be given. When youth reach the age of catechetical instruction, there's a great difference between those who've attended Sunday School and those who've not. Think of a 7th grade classroom with some having a knowledge of math and reading and others seeing numbers and letters for the first time. To teach in such a context means starting from scratch, altering curriculum that assumes previous years

- of instruction. The matter is compounded when adults are unwilling to serve as Sunday School teachers. Teacher shortages hurt.
- Practicing ongoing confession and forgiveness: No pastor, parent, or child is perfect. We are sinners made holy by Christ. Teaching faith includes modeling the God of grace and forgiving love. When children see parents repenting and confessing sin (in the home and in worship), they mature by the experience of grace. They learn gratitude for God and are inspired to gratefully serve throughout life, using their time, talent, and treasure.

So when does catechism begin? In truth, faith formation is a life-long process that begins at birth. When our three children were born, I read from the Bible in their birthing rooms, asking God to bless their lives. Regularly, I ask God to remember these prayers made on their birthdays. Let us pray for catechism; for the renewal of faith in Europe, North America, and the entire world. Renewal includes repentance, the humility to make course corrections to begin anew. We are saved by grace through faith in Christ. May love for Christ become again the first love of every home.

In-Person Sunday Morning Liturgy at Mt. Lebanon United Lutheran Church

Updated November 29, 2021

As we continue to hold Sunday morning liturgy in our building, we are taking great care to worship in a safe, responsible manner. While constant vigilance is needed by all considering COVID-19 variants that have emerged, we will continue to safely congregate to praise and worship the Lord in person. Virtual worship and telephone worship will continue to be available for those unable to join in person.

Prior to Worship in our Sanctuary

Wellness: We encourage all to be vaccinated and get the booster vaccine when you are eligible. This includes both COVID-19 and flu vaccines.

Entrances: There will be three locations to enter the church building:

Front Door leading into the Narthex from the Governor's Drive (Washington Rd.)

Side Door on the north driveway near the Handicap Parking spaces

Rear Door accessible from the parking lot behind the Christian Education wing.

All other doors will be locked from the outside to reduce internal traffic into areas of the building that would then need to be sanitized.

Facemasks are required for all individuals while in the building regardless of vaccination status. Masks must cover the nose and mouth. Individuals are asked to supply their own masks or coverings. (One-time use masks will be available at the rear entrance and in the Narthex should one forget their mask.)

Social Distancing should be practiced by everyone. All worshippers should continue to use good judgment regarding social distancing and safe health practices.

Offering Plates will be positioned near the entrances to the worship space. Please place your offering in the plate as you walk to a designated pew. You are also invited to use the my E-offering link at www.MtLebanonLutheran.org.

Bulletins will be positioned on tables near the entrance to the nave (next to the Offering Plates) for your use. Please pick up your bulletin, take it with you to the pew, and take the bulletin home with you at the conclusion of the Liturgy. (The events and other information may be referenced during the week!)

During Worship

Pews: Worshippers are encouraged to maintain social distancing during liturgies as much as possible. Please sit in designated pews and respect the ribbons that identify which pews are available for seating and social distancing.

Worship: Music, Hymns, and Anthems will be led by the choir or appointed leaders from the Chancel. Singing in the pews will be allowed with face coverings in place.

Holy Communion will be celebrated at each liturgy. Follow the special procedures that have been established for the safe distribution of the Eucharist. Pastor will wear a mask. NEW GUIDELINE: Please do not remove face coverings until after receiving the host and wine AND moving beyond the tables on either side of the center aisle.

At the Conclusion of Worship

Maintain Social Distancing as you leave the building. It is important to minimize the potential for exposure.

Fellowship in the Narthex will be held near the doors to allow for additional air circulation. Greet fellow worshipers at safe distances from one another. Individual beverages and packaged treats will be available, and masks should be removed only when eating or drinking Wrappers will be recycled as a demonstration of our environmental stewardship.

Due to reduced coffee consumption, please consider supporting the Coffee Project of Lutheran World Relief during this time.

Telephone-based Liturgy is available at 10 am on Sunday mornings. If you are interested in worshipping by phone, please contact the Church Office by Friday at Noon.

Musical Musings— February, 2022 Larry Allen

Dear Mt. Lebanon Lutheran Family and Friends,

In the Spring of 2005, I received a call from then Pastor Bruce Pedersen telling me that the position of Organist and Director of Music here was open and wondering if I might be interested in auditioning. At that point I had been musician at another church for a year, and was in conversations with them about expanding the position. Yet the job in Mt. Lebanon sounded intriguing and I agreed to come and play for the Pastor and discuss possibilities. That happened soon thereafter and then I heard nothing for about 6 weeks. I had pretty much dismissed the notion of a new position and then the phone call came! I began my work in August of 2005 and suddenly almost 17 years have passed!

I believe we have accomplished some wonderful things here, from expanding the size of the Chancel Choir and section leaders to purchasing a lovely piano for the sanctuary, to bringing some quality services enhanced by accompaniment from members of the Pittsburgh Symphony. These have been wonderful moments for me, and I hope for many of you, and this could not have happened without the backing of Pastor Heagy and the Worship and Music Committee, as well as those who contributed regularly to the Fine Arts fund to support these musical ventures. Believe me, every church musician does not have this undergirding and I have appreciated it more than I can say.

But time does march on and as I have recently turned 72, I realize that it is time for me to step aside and let a younger person come in with fresh approaches and new ideas. The Search Committee will soon begin its work and I feel confident that an excellent musician is "waiting in the wings" for just this position. As most of you know my life partner, Scott Bell, completes his third year as Professor of Oboe at the Juilliard School in Tianjin, China in May. He also will be retiring (after 27 years previously in the PSO) and I look forward to new adventures together.

And, though this letter needs to go out now, we still have many months together and I trust for more exciting musical happenings along the way. My job is the envy of many colleagues who have followed our progress, and the strong foundation here now will be the basis for even better musical days to come. I will watch with joy as I see that develop! Meanwhile, let's continue our pilgrimage together on Sunday mornings, and I'll look for you in church.

The Transfiguration of Our Lord



Sunday, February 27, 2022 [The Last Sunday after the Epiphany]

If you have ever struggled with a novel that takes you through countless plot twists and turns, and you have skipped ahead to read the final chapter in order to see more clearly where you are going, then you have a sense of how the Transfiguration works in the Gospel, and how Transfiguration Sunday works in the church's year of grace.

The Transfiguration of our Lord is not only the last of the manifestations [epiphanies] of Christ which we encounter on the Sundays after the Epiphany, it also offers a glimpse of the resurrected Christ in His glory. Peter and the disciples objected to His suffering and dying, to this turn in the plot of Jesus' life [as they perceived it], but now, at the Transfiguration, they see what is to become of Him.

In addition, this glimpse of the final chapter of Jesus' life will be our guide through the twists and turns of the wilderness of Lent, where we will end our journey, with the disciples, at the tree of life.

The Transfiguration is not only the story of Christ's life, it is also the story of our life as well, for "if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his" [Saint Paul].

Transfiguration Sunday is also the day we return the Palm branches from last year so that they may be imposed on Ash Wednesday.

NEW COLUMBARIUM - South Chancel Wall

As announced in the January 2022 Voice newsletter and approved by our council, we have signed a contract with *Armento Incorporated* of Buffalo, NY, to manufacture a new 48-niche columbarium, identical to the existing north chancel wall columbarium. The delivery date is sometime in late Spring followed by the installation on the south chancel wall.

Interment in the columbarium is open to church members and their extended families, and the specific policy covering the use of and payments for the columbarium niches is available upon request from the church office.

The size of each niche is suitable for the cremations of one or two individuals. The cost of each niche is \$1,000 for interment of a single individual and \$1,500 for the interment of two.

2022: Your year for generosity

"You will be enriched in every way for your great generosity!"

2 Corinthians 9:11

As you make resolutions and set goals for the New Year, be sure to include this one: "I will be more generous in 2022." It will bless you – and your community and neighbor!

The Bible makes clear that generosity leads to a more abundant life. Generous people experience one of those paradoxes of the Kingdom of God, where the last are first, the greatest is servant to all, and whoever loses her life for Christ will gain it. The paradox? Generous people get back far more than they give.

First, a clarification: The paradox is NOT a financial strategy to maximize return on investment. That would be missing the point. Besides, there are more important things to give than money, such as time, service, kindness, forgiveness, compassion, love, and joy. And what we get back may not be quantifiable. How do you measure wellbeing and happiness?

Generosity's real "payback" is what and who we become when we cultivate a habit of giving. Giving transforms us into generous-hearted people, and generous-hearted people tend to experience a real abundance of joy, peace, love, and security. The old saying is most certainly true: The open palm holds more than the closed fist.

For 2022, set a goal to be more generous. Start by increasing your charitable giving above last year's offering, but also aim to give away your time, to serve your neighbor, to be lavish in compassion, extravagant in love.

Pray that God will guide you and help you experience the paradox: Givers get back more than they give away.

Tax Reform Act May Make QCD's More Appealing

Several years ago, Qualified Charitable Distributions became an option for IRA holders, who are at least 70 ½, to donate directly to qualified charities. This has several possible good tax outcomes for the IRA holder. In cases where the taxpayer is taking the standard deduction, direct contribution will keep the IRA distribution out of taxable income, lowering taxes if you do not itemize. This also reduces Adjusted Gross Income that may reduce taxes on Social Security benefits and reduce the taxpayer's Medicare premiums.

While nothing changed in 2021 as far as these rules, the near doubling of the standard deduction makes it more likely that taxpayer's will be taking the standard deduction. Taking an IRA distribution that goes into taxable income may not be offset by an itemized deduction for charitable contributions, increasing taxes. In short, contributions to MLULC (or other charities) may be more tax effective if donated directly from an IRA to the charity rather than being distributed to the taxpayer and then contributed to the charity. "Qualified charitable distributions count towards your required minimum distribution, if you have one this year."

- Say "Amen" or use "Reactions" such as "Likes" and "Loves" when you are moved by Word or Music.



- 1 Black History Month Give thanks for the gifts, accomplishments, influence and witness of our African-descent neighbors we stand together as siblings in Christ and partners in the gospel, doing God's work in the world together. Pray that God will guide our church as it strives for racial justice, socioeconomic equity, racial reconciliation and an end to racism in our church, society and institutions.
- 2 Give thanks for the small and subtle ways in which the Spirit encourages and deepens our faith each and every day.
- 3 Pray for parish nurses who serve in ministries of health and healing and for the ELCA-affiliated Evangelical Lutheran Parish Nurse Association, which supports parish nurses and promotes a culture of health, healing and wholeness in Lutheran congregations, agencies and communities.
- 4 Pray for those who lost homes and were displaced during the December wildfires in Boulder County, Colo. Give thanks for the partnership of Lutheran Disaster Response, the Rocky Mountain Synod and Lutheran Family Services Rocky Mountains as they work together to provide food, temporary shelter, emotional and spiritual care, and assistance with recovery work.
- **5** Pray that our anxieties about the future will be quieted by the assurance that the Spirit's gifts of hope and peace are more powerful and enduring than the threats and uncertainties we face in life.
- 6 Pray that, just as the fishermen Simon Peter, James and John dropped everything they were doing to follow Jesus, we, too, with all our gifts and flaws, might respond to God's call to spread the good news of Jesus Christ, serve our neighbors in need and do God's work in the world.
- 7 Remember in prayer those impacted by severe weather, especially Typhoon Rai in the Philippines and the recent tornadoes, flooding and winter storms across our country. Pray that God's presence will bring healing and hope during recovery, comfort those grieving the loss of loved ones, and strengthen the people and organizations that respond to crises and help with recovery, including Lutheran Disaster Response.
- 8 Remember and give thanks for siblings in Christ of every generation who have shared the gospel, inspired others to believe, and borne God's grace, peace and hope into the world through their words, example, service and sacrifice.
- **9** We live in a time of war, conflict and unrest in many regions of the world. Pray for the safety of people living amid turmoil, the well-being of refugees and immigrants fleeing threats, and the protection of children and youth living in circumstances unimaginable to us. Ask the Spirit to guide us as courageous and compassionate advocates, peacemakers, companions and bearers of hope in the world.
- 10 Pray for the leaders of youth and family ministries and for outdoor ministry professionals as they participate in the ELCA Youth Ministry Network Extravaganza in Minneapolis, an event that provides them with encouragement, support, education and networking opportunities.
- 11 "I give you thanks, O Lord, with my whole heart" (Psalm 138:1). Pray that every aspect of our life, service and generosity will reflect our gratitude for God's awesome, undeserved love and blessings.
- 12 Give thanks and praise to God for the companion-synod relationships that connect our synods and congregations with Lutheran churches around the world, blessing, nurturing and strengthening them for their ministry together.
- 13 Give thanks that God teaches us something new every day and equips us so well to share the good news of Jesus Christ, care for neighbors in need and reflect God's gracious love through our words, actions and interactions with people.
- 14 Pray for immigrants and refugees, in our country and around the world, who seek safety, relief and a place to rebuild their lives. Ask that God's compassion, wisdom and desire for justice guide us in resolving the problems and crises that displace people from their homes and notions.

- 15 "Blessed are those who trust in the Lord, whose trust is the Lord. They shall be like a tree planted by water, sending out its roots by the stream. It shall not fear when heat comes, and its leaves shall stay green" (Jeremiah 17:7-8). Praise God for the work of the Spirit, which renews and nourishes us when we feel uncertain, weary or anxious.
- 16 Thank God for our special relationship with the Moravian Church in America, a full communion partner with the ELCA since 1999. Pray for the church, its members and its leaders, that together we will find strength and resources for the work of sharing the gospel and serving our neighbor, especially in these challenging times.
- 17 Pray that the Spirit will help us understand and follow the ways, desires and commandments of God that protect our well-being in daily life.
- 18 Give thanks that our faith and hope are grounded in Christ's resurrection and the promise of one day being raised to eternal life as God's children. Pray that the Spirit will help us articulate in our own imperfect words our joy, our faith and the good news of Jesus Christ for all people.
- 19 Pray that our seminaries and Lay Schools for Ministry program will grow, thrive and prepare our church leaders for ministry in diverse and changing contexts, in the present and with insightful anticipation of the future
- 20 "Love your enemies, do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return. Your reward will be great, and you will be children of the Most High; for he is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. Be merciful, just as [God] is merciful" (Luke 6:35-36). Ask the Spirit to help us do what seems difficult or impossible and live as willing disciples of Christ.
- 21 Reflect on what God is stirring in us right now, and pray that we might discern what God calls us to be: bearers of love, hope, healing, reconciliation and the good news of Jesus Christ.
