Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished. –Luke 4:1-2

How the pandemic changed life will eventually be forgotten; for now, we still remember "15 days to flatten the curve." We remained then at home, stocked up on supplies, feared touching boxes delivered to us, retrieving them with gloves. Items were hard to find, but family life in some ways improved. We were safely together in one place with nowhere to go. The pace of life slowed to a near halt.

Our church council has voted to drop the mask mandate inside our building. We are now free to worship without face masks. We will continue to monitor the CDC guidelines, but for now a bit of normalcy dawns. Whether people return to worship remains to be seen. A recent article had the headline, "*They May Not Come Back.*"

Lent begins this month, starting on Ash Wednesday, and it will be as it's always been—a season of returning to God. Lent is 40 days when we engage in penitence, selfexamination, prayer, and fasting. We look inward. We ask questions: *Has God been first in my life? Has serving others been the focus of my life? Have I been faithful to prayer and keeping Sabbath compared to doing other things? Is there a purpose to my life beyond vain efforts to create generational wealth? To whom do I pledge my allegiance?* 

We are emerging from a difficult, viral period of world history but now may be entering very bellicose years. Some have lost faith. *They May Not Come Back* is an ominous headline, but our mission has always been a challenge. It's hard to sell the cross. People are disinclined to line up for a regiment of self-sacrifice, putting others first, giving away time and treasure. Only the Holy Spirit can convert selfish hearts. Following Christ is a joyous, challenging life.

Now that we are worshiping without face masks and can fully see each other again, I invite all members and friends to return. Make a gift to the church during the 40 days of Lent this year—the gift of living fully and gratefully for God. Let us follow Jesus in these 40 days, meditating on how he was tempted yet remained without sin. By God's grace, let us overcome the temptation not to worship. Blessings to all who will join Jesus, keeping holy Lent's forty days.

# The Law's Tithing versus the Gospel's Free Generosity



Next time you're at a church social function, go up to people who seem to be having fun and start talking about *tithing*. Most will run for cover faster than vampires at dawn. But the ones who remain may have an interesting story to share.

That's because a wide majority believes that *giving a tenth of their gross income* is utterly impossible and totally unrealistic. For instance, if a family makes \$52,000, that would be a donation of \$100 a week. If they're typical "2 percenters," they put a \$20 bill in the weekly offering envelope and be satisfied. It's truly a real stretch to ask them to put in the other \$80 for a tithe.

Some churchgoers criticize tithing as too rigid and legalistic — more the province of Pharisees and scribes than of Christians, who, after all, have been freed by Jesus from the law. Yes, it's true, we are free from the law, but as Martin Luther points out, the law does serve God's purpose in the lives of faithful people.

First, the law helps keep order in our world by shaping our outward behavior. If people are giving financially to the work of God because they feel compelled to do so, they are still contributing financially to the work of God.

But the second use of the law is more to the point. The daunting requirements of the law can lead us to despair and guilt and awareness of our selfish, sinful nature. That in turn causes us to turn to the Gospel for its message of freedom and joy. And in response to God's love, we gladly give more, and more and more.

That's the story you may hear from the people still talking to you at the church function. Most people who have taken the plunge of tithing have found it surprisingly rewarding. The satisfaction they get from giving money away leads many to offer above the 10 percent level.

It's counter-intuitive to think that giving away more money will actually make you feel richer, happier and more fulfilled, but that's a very common experience of tithers. By walking on the path of the law of tithing, they have actually found themselves in a place where they can enjoy the Gospel's freedom for generosity. They have learned the truth of Jesus' observation of Matthew 6:21: "Where your treasure is, there your heart shall be also."

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# Musical Musings—March 2022

Lent begins this month and it is about as late as it can be on the Christian calendar. It is a time for personal reflection and we often hear of people "giving up something for Lent." I wonder if we might adapt that phrase to "take something on for Lent." It need not be a big effort but there are things all of us might do to enrich our Lenten experience. Consider, from a musical perspective:

making a point of being in worship each Sunday during Lent

- looking at our hymns with a new set of eyes they are usually chosen to reflect the meaning of the Scriptures. Maybe you are not a singer (though everyone can make a joyful noise!), but you might read the texts as they are sung so that you are participating in that part of the worship experience.
- setting aside the dates of special services for Holy Week so that you haven't scheduled something else which cannot be changed when you realize it's Holy Week!
- and, consider inviting someone to some liturgy which promises something meaningful. Churches grow and thrive not only by the work of the Pastor and staff, but when members are willing to say "we have something we are proud of and I think you might enjoy it too."

One particularly special Sunday will be March 13 when *Marino Galluzzo* returns from Arizona and joins us with his saxophone in worship for both liturgies. At the 10:00 service he will also accompany the choir on a fine arrangement of - hold on - "Jesus Loves Me." We will be so glad to welcome him back with us and to hear him again.

Looking ahead to April – please put Holy Thursday, March 14 at 7:30 on your calendar. We will have the traditional communion service and stripping of the altar, and in addition the choir, with guest oboist Amelia van Horn, will offer a cantata entitled "Light in the Darkness." It is a Tenebrae service which captures the poignancy and drama of Holy Week. Narrators from our congregation will also play an important part. Come and be a part of a meaningful experience – a good time to invite that friend!

# Images of Lent

We mark the start of Lent on March 2. The ashes of Ash Wednesday remind us that we, as a people baptized into the death of



Christ, are repenting in order to follow Jesus. So, what does God want from us?

An answer comes early in our Lenten readings. God wants a great deal more from us than just our presence in worship, and the prophet Isaiah calls us to account when we have failed to do it. Lent is an invitation to a fast, but the kind of fast God wants us to observe is not merely an abstention from gluttony, but a deliberate, dedicated striving aimed at achieving justice for all of God's children. It was the challenge Isaiah offered to his listeners, and it is the challenge that remains for us today.

Isaiah told the people then [and those now who wear the ashes] that they missed the point of the ashes by concentrating on their dramatic portrayal of repentant suffering. The focus should be on what is really important: those who are poor, oppressed, hungry, and homeless. Sacrificing for others was and is a profoundly counter-cultural indictment of things the way they were, and of the way people allow themselves to become.

The ashes of Lent remind us of our call to be servants, and lead us also to acknowledge that, no matter how hard we try, we cannot save ourselves.

In truth, the real discipline of Lent is intended to clear away what is extra so that we might focus on what is essential: our relationship with God. Lent invites us to fast, because we do not live by bread alone. Lent calls us to give offerings in response to what God gives us in Christ. Lent reminds us to pray, not to get something from God, but because God is God and worthy of our prayers of thanksgiving and praise.

Those who bear the cross of ashes know this truth. It is the truth we must not forget even though so much of the world and even so many members of our families, get swept along by a glib psychology of life.

Isaiah knew the temptation to ignore the truth, and it is hard to resist that temptation, and difficult to do God's will, and painful to work for justice.

But the faithful will follow God, empowered by their baptism, and marked with the cross of Christ.



# **NEW COLUMBARIUM - South Chancel Wall**

As announced in the January 2022 Voice newsletter and approved by our council, we have signed a contract with *Armento Incorporated* of Buffalo, NY, to manufacture a new 48-niche columbarium, identical to the existing north chancel wall columbarium. The delivery date is sometime in late Spring followed by the installation on the south chancel wall.

Interment in the columbarium is open to church members and their extended families, and the specific policy covering the use of and payments for the columbarium niches is available upon request from the church office.

The size of each niche is suitable for the cremations of one or two individuals. The cost of each niche is \$1,000 for interment of a single individual and \$1,500 for the interment of two.



Genuine, Spirit-filled fasting calls for intentional preparation. Such fasting calls for the following as a minimum:

- Examine your motives (Isa. 58:3-7
- Surrender your life fully to Jesus Christ as your Lord and Savior (Rom. 12:1,2)
- Ask God to reveal your sins to you (Ps. 19:12)
- Confess your sins (1 John 1:9)
- Seek forgiveness from those you have offended (Mark 11:25; Luke 17:3,4)
- Make restitution as the Holy Spirit leads (Matt. 5:23-26)
- Ask God to fill you with His Holy Spirit (Eph. 5:18)
- consult with your physician before beginning a fast of any length.

# What to do while fasting...

- •Pray (Dan. 9:3; Acts 14:23);
- •Meditate on the Word of God (Ps. 1:1,2; Col. 3:16).

•Meditate on the attributes of God: love, grace,

wisdom, compassion, sovereignty (Pss. 48:9, 10; 103:1-13).

•Expect God to bless you and reveal Himself to you (Heb. 11:6).

•Do not underestimate spiritual opposition (Gal. 5:16, 17)

•Refuse to yield to your worldly nature (Rom. 12:1,2).

•Exhibit an attitude of joy (Zech. 8:19; Matt, 6:17,18).

# A CALL TO A VIGIL OF PRAYER AROUND-THE-CLOCK DAILY THROUGHOUT HOLY WEEK

*Because prayer is grounded in God; because prayer is answered; because prayer has no substitute; because prayer is power;* 

and Paul asked for prayer without ceasing, and Peter asked for a watch of prayer, and never forgetting that Jesus commanded "Watch therefore, and pray always"

The 156 hours from the close of worship of Passion [Palm] Sunday until the faithful gather for the Vigil of Easter is one of the most important weeks in our congregation's life.

Pastor Doug is participating and invites you to join with your congregational family members in the Holy Week Vigil of Prayer. Around-the-clock, prayers of confession, adoration, thanksgiving, intercession and petition will be brought before our Heavenly Father's throne of grace.

Each prayer participant will select one or more hours in the Holy Week schedule during which they will maintain the Vigil. A sign-up posterboard will be placed in the narthex beginning March 6 for those attending sanctuary worship. Those who worship virtually and all others who wish to join in the vigil must call the church office to reserve vigil times (412-563-0300).

A guidebook listing congregational members, missionaries, church leaders, governmental officials, the afflicted and homebound, as well as many others in need of prayer, will be provided to all participants. In the guidebook you will find suggestions for opening and closing your hour of prayer. Common prayers in the booklet, hymnal, and other prayerbooks may assist you. You may find the hour to pass very quickly! God will bless your service.

All participants will pray at home or in some other location other than the sanctuary. Participation of home-bound and out-of-town members is encouraged.

As we return to our congregational campus for Worship, Christian Education, and other Activities, we are taking great care to provide safe conditions with practices that are informed by respected health experts and organizations. While closely monitoring our ever-evolving circumstances, we will safely congregate to praise and worship the Lord in person. Virtual worship and livestreaming will continue for those unable to join in person.

### When in the Building

**Wellness**: We encourage all to be vaccinated and get the booster vaccine when eligible. This includes both COVID-19 and flu vaccines.

**Social Distancing** should be practiced by everyone. All worshippers and visitors should continue to use good judgment regarding social distancing and safe health practices.

**Facemasks** are optional while in the building. Those who wish to continue wearing their masks will be welcomed and respected. One-time use masks will be available at the rear entrance and in the Narthex for those who wish to wear a mask.

# **Worship Practices**

**Bulletins** will be positioned on tables near the entrance to the nave (next to the Offering Plates) for your use. Please pick up your bulletin, take it with you to the pew, and take the bulletin home with you at the conclusion of the Liturgy. (The events and other information may be referenced during the week!)

**Offering Plates** will be positioned near the entrances to the worship space. Please place your offering in the plate as you walk to a designated pew. You are also invited to use the myE-offering link at <u>www.MtLebanonLutheran.org</u>.

**Pews:** Worshippers are encouraged to maintain social distancing during liturgies as much as possible. Please sit in designated pews and respect the ribbons that identify which pews are available for seating and social distancing.

**Distribution of Holy Communion:** Social distance down the middle aisle to receive the Eucharist and dispose of your portion cups in the receptacles located on either side of each section of pews as you return to your seats. Do not consume the elements until you have moved beyond the tables on either side of the center aisle.

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# At the Conclusion of Worship

**Fellowship in the Narthex** is held near the Narthex doors or outside. Individual beverages and packaged treats will be available for all to enjoy while greeting one another.

Wrappers will be recycled as a demonstration of our environmental stewardship.

This week begins the season of Lent on Ash Wednesday March 2. In-person Liturgies will be held at 11:00 AM and 7:30 PM and will include the imposition of ashes. The 7:30 PM Liturgy also will be livestreamed on Facebook. All are encouraged to attend in-person worship on this solemn day.

# **MASKING GUIDELINES**

The Congregational Council has voted unanimously to end the mask mandate in our church building. Face coverings are now optional. Social distancing practices remain in place. The Council will continue to monitor the situation and refine guidelines as necessary.

On February 25, 2022, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention updated its guidance for mask wearing. By following the CDC guidelines, we join the policy now in place with the Mt. Lebanon School District. Allegheny County's "low transmission" status was a main factor in adopting the new guidelines.

The CDC notes that people may choose to mask at any time. People who are not yet vaccinated or have other health and/or family considerations are welcomed and should feel comfortable and respected as they continue to wear masks in the church building.

**1** Women's History Month Celebrate and give thanks for the achievements, influence, leadership, stories, gifts and faithful witness of women in our church and society throughout history. Pray for women who suffer injustice, demeaning stereotypes, violence and poverty, that they will cling to hope and be delivered from their suffering and persecution to live freely and boldly as loved and valued children of God.

**2** Ash Wednesday On this day, let us approach God in prayer with humble and penitent hearts, marking ourselves with the ashes of our messy, fragile human lives yet doing so with the reassuring sign of the cross — the mark of Jesus Christ, our source of forgiveness, salvation, hope and new life.

**3** Pray for our synod bishops and presiding bishop as they gather for the Conference of Bishops. Ask God to bless their time together for worship, study, building relationships and deliberating on how we can share the good news of Jesus Christ, serve our neighbor, strive for justice and peace, work alongside our global companions and grow the church.

**4** Praise God, who is boundless, awesome, merciful, pure and attentive, and who loves justice and peace.

**5** Remember in prayer refugees from Afghanistan, Iraq and Syria who have been stuck at the Belarus-Poland border since last November; pray for the Lutheran Church in Belarus as it assists refugees with translation services, food, clothing, hygiene items and other essentials; and give thanks for the support and assistance we are able to provide through Lutheran Disaster Response.

**6** Give thanks that we know Jesus as the son of God, who did not give in to worldly temptations of power or serving his own needs but humbled himself and demonstrated God's sacrificial love for the salvation and healing of human-kind.

7 Pray for the work, advocacy and networks of ELCA Disability Ministry, and that our congregations and communities might, without hestitation, preconception or limitation, connect with and embrace people living with disabilities, inviting them into full participation in the life and leadership of the church and society.

**8** International Women's Day Celebrate and give thanks to God for the gifts, influence and leadership of women and girls everywhere. Pray that we will continue to strive for a world free of bias and injustice, providing women and girls with equitable access to education, health care, work and opportunities to use their gifts in the church, our communities and our world.

**9** Ask the Spirit to help us see beyond our weaknesses and self-doubt and confess with confidence our faith in the saving, life-giving love of Jesus Christ and the encouragement we receive from our siblings in Christ.

10 Give thanks that our church accompanies our global companions, working together to share God's love, respond to neighbors in need and participate in God's mission.

11 Lift up prayers of gratitude that God is our refuge and fortress, the one in whom we can trust in every circumstance, no matter how complicated or threatening.

12 During Lent, as we spend time reflecting on our human weakness and limitations, pray that we do not slip into discouragement or hopelessness but allow the Spirit to lead us toward the hope, forgiveness and newness we receive as a gift through Jesus Christ, the manifestation of God's enduring and redeeming love for us.

13 Give thanks for the humbling, awe-inspiring example of Jesus Christ, who persisted in his ministry and work of healing the world undeterred by criticism and death threats. Pray that the Spirit will inspire and embolden us to be committed and unwavering as we care for our neighbors in need, sharing our faith and spreading the life-changing good news of Jesus Christ.

14 Pray for the community ministries of congregations across the country that serve neighbors in need through community gardens, meals, food pantries, homeless shelters, counseling, disaster response, neighborhood renewal, day care for children and adults, educational opportunities and connecting volunteers with ecumenical partners and community organizations.

15 Pray that being siblings in Christ will inspire us to encourage and care for one another; equip each other to live our faith and serve our neighbor; strive for justice and peace in the world; trust each other with our joys, sorrows and questions; and gather together to praise God for claiming and restoring us as loved children with an eternal inheritance.

16 Our church has deep, long-standing relationships with Lutheran churches and partners around the world. Pray that we will grow stronger as a global church, receive one another's gifts and expertise, and support the growth and work of our companions, which includes urban and youth outreach, establishing new congregations, providing theological education, pursuing justice and peace, and training new leaders.

17 Thank God for our special relationship with the United Church of Christ, a full communion partner with the ELCA since 1997. Pray for the church, its members and its leaders, that together we will find strength and resources for the work of sharing the gospel and serving our neighbor, especially in these challenging times.

**18** Ask God to remind us that we accomplish far more of God's work in the world by embracing relationships and partnerships with our siblings in Christ and others.

**19** Pray for ELCA Global Mission personnel, Young Adults in Global Mission and seminary interns who accompany and support the work of our companion churches around the world, especially as they adapt to the changing needs, circumstances and opportunities in their respective countries during the lingering pandemic.

**20** *First day of spring* Praise God for the wonders of creation and the signs of hope, life and renewal that emerge with spring.

**21** Pray that our lives, relationships and behaviors might reflect God's patience and undeserved confidence in our capacity to change, grow and love as the Spirit works within us.

22 World Water Day God's gift of water — in all its forms — nourishes and sustains life and stirs awe and wonder. Pray that we will faithfully steward the water resources entrusted to our care and enjoyment. Pray that we will work together to conserve water, help those who lack access to clean water, take thoughtful action during droughts and do the work of cleaning up and protecting water that we have polluted or misused.

**23** Give thanks for God's faithfulness, actions, teaching and example throughout the ages, which guide us to follow the word and desires of God, enrich our faith, and bear hope and the good news of Jesus Christ to all people.

24 Pray for ELCA missionaries serving alongside church bodies and companion organizations in Central America to train leaders; share the gospel; respond to poverty, hunger and violence; advocate for laws that respect the human rights and dignity of migrants, refugees and asylum-seekers; and teach church leaders to care for victims of trauma.

**25** "My mouth praises you with joyful lips when I think of you on my bed, and meditate on you in the watches of the night; for you have been my help, and in the shadow of your wings I sing for joy. My soul clings to you" (Psalm 63:5-8). Thank God for being our ready help and refuge in every moment of our life.

**26** Across the country, congregations and synods working with resettlement agencies are sponsoring individuals and families who have been evacuated from Afghanistan. Pray that the Spirit will guide our efforts to welcome, support and care for people who are resettling and adjusting to unfamiliar communities, neighbors and cultures. Give thanks for the challenging and essential work of Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service, Lutheran Services in America and the ELCA's AMMPARO strategy (Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities).

27 Recall recent experiences — personal or witnessed <u>—</u> when God's grace far exceeded your expectations and comprehension. Lift up prayers of ac-knowledgment and gratitude to God.

**28** Ask God to build up our resiliency, optimism, hope and confidence in God's presence when we feel anxious, overwhelmed or powerless in today's world.

**29** Rejoice and give thanks to God for surrounding us with steadfast love and forgiveness that cannot be taken away or diminished by anyone or anything.

**30** Remember in prayer poets who free us to see and contemplate in new ways the beauty and complexity of creation, diverse human experiences, challenging social conditions and our faith.

**31** Pray for the leaders from across our church who serve on the ELCA Church Council. Ask the Spirit to guide them as they support, review, advise and enable God's work in the world with thoughtfulness, integrity, respect and partnerships sharing a common vision.
