Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. They came to Philip...and said to him, "Sir, we wish to see Jesus." –John 12:20-21

The Germans are coming! Sounds pejorative, but it's true, the Germans are coming! German students and teachers are coming to Mount Lebanon this month. For three decades, Mount Lebanon High School has participated in an exchange program that brings visitors from Germany. For two weeks this month, students and teachers from Dresden, Saxony's capital city, will live with host families in our area. Two families of our church are serving as hosts this year.

Hosting German students and teachers is not the only way our church serves others. Weekly, newly arrived persons from countries throughout the world meet in our church to receive English language instruction. Refugees are also served by our Social Ministry Committee. A supply room in our education wing is filled with clothing and household items to help in their transitions.

The church at its best is always a welcoming place, reflecting the open arms of Jesus. As Jesus was nearing the end of his life, the Gospel of John includes a story about the arrival of Greek persons wishing to see Jesus. They said to the disciple Philip, "We wish to see Jesus." Philip relayed their message to Andrew and they both went and told Jesus of the Greeks' desire to meet him.

Jesus did not die for the sins of some, but for the sins of all. In worship, we sing, "Lamb of God, you take away the sins of the world. Have mercy on us." May the host families in our congregation this month, may the weekly English language instruction provided in our church, may the refugee work of our Social Ministry Committee remind us of the open arms of Jesus. His arms were extended on a cross, but he was not defeated in death. While some at Calvary saw the crucifixion as defeat, by faith we see atonement being effectuated for the entire world.

The world finds a welcome in our church each week. This month, two families are opening their homes to visitors from Europe. The love of Christ urges us on in this way of self-giving. Let us be steadfast in this way of faith, which is our witness to the world of the one God who loves all. God is love and Christ is God's love incarnate.

Educational Ministries reach, teach, and nurture all of God's people as we equip them to be disciples of Christ for the Glory of God.

What Lutherans Believe about Christian Education

Lutherans believe that Christian Education:

- --guides and supports the whole people of God through a lifelong process of forming faith in Jesus Christ;
- --equips believers to proclaim God's grace revealed in Jesus Christ for all people;
- --helps individuals to live faithfully in relationships with God, one another and all of creation;
- --is rooted in Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions that have shaped our faith and continue to be passed from generation to generation.

What Lutherans Believe about the Bible

- -- The words of the Bible point us to the Word incarnate, Jesus Christ.
- --When we read the Bible, we do more than *learn* about God—we *meet* God!
- --God has given us the Bible: Psalm 119:105; Luke 11:28, Romans 1:16; 2 Timothy 3:15
- -- The Bible alone is the only rule and guiding principle according to which all teachings and teachers are to be evaluated and judged.
- --God speaks to us through the Bible so that we may believe *in* Jesus Christ as Lord.

It all Began at Baptism

By the waters of Holy Baptism we are claimed as God's own and brought into a new community.

Parents have been given the privilege of primary care for God's gift of their children. In Baptism parents agree to teach and model for their children a faith based on Scripture, the Apostle's Creed, the Ten Commandments, worship attendance, and to provide for their instruction in the Christian faith.

Teachers in our ministry of Christian Education partner with parents to nurture an increase in understanding God's boundless love, acceptance and forgiveness in Jesus Christ.

Youth Service Projects

As Christians, we are called to be Jesus' disciples in the world. We practice discipleship through prayer, worship, Bible reading, sharing time & talents, and serving others. We do these things in Christian love, and understand that they are not requirements to receive the gift of God's grace.

We hope that in serving others we share our love for God and our neighbors, and that these experiences will provide opportunities to meet friends, learn and grow in our spiritual lives. They accept shopping appointments and deliveries on a limited basis. Fresh produce is delivered once a month. Weekly donations from Shop n Save (fresh bread products) and Potomac Bakery (pastries and donuts).

Reformation Sunday October 27



Let's celebrate: For Lutherans and many other Protestants in America, the last Sunday in October is celebrated as Reformation Sunday. Reformation Sunday honors Martin Luther's bold action on October 31st, 1517. On that date Luther posted his statement of faith, known as the 95 Theses, on the door of Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany. This was the beginning of the Protestant Reformation. Reformation was first celebrated on varied dates. After the Thirty Years' War, in 1667 John George II, Elector of Saxony, ordered a Reformation Festival to be celebrated on October 31st. In modern times, the observance was transferred to the nearest Sunday before or after October 29.

Psalm 46, appointed for the day is the basis for Luther's most famous hymn *Ein'feste Burg is unsert Gott* [A Mighty Fortress is Our God]. Join us in worship on October 27th as we remember Martin Luther and celebrate Reformation Sunday.

Worship Liturgies of Word, Sacrament and Healing

in observance of

The Feast Day of Saint Luke

Evangelist and Physician

Sunday, October 13 at 8:30 and 10:00 AM

Is any one of you sick? He should call the elders of The church to pray over him And anoint him with oil In the name of the Lord." James 5:14

Liturgies of healing, a practice begun in our congregation in 1986, will be led again on Sunday, October 16, in observance of the Feast Day of Saint Luke. **Both Sunday morning liturgies will emphasize healing on this day.**

The liturgy of healing is based on the ministry of Christ, the nature and call of the Church, our Lutheran heritage, and a deep desire to touch more deeply the lives of those in our congregational family, community, and nation who are hurting and in need of healing.

Included in these liturgies are hymns, psalms, Biblical readings, a brief homily and prayers, including a remembrance of those who suffer; those recovering from sickness [whether it be of heart, mind or body]; those who are addicted; those who must face decisions about appropriate treatment and those who are caregivers.

Participants are those who desire healing in any form, those who wish to intercede on another's behalf, and those who desire to be a part of the Church's healing community in the world. So that each worshiper might understand more fully the ministry of our Lord and His Church in healing, this article will provide additional biblical perspectives on healing.

Jesus and Healing

Healing works occupied a great part of our Lord's activities in the three years of His public ministry. Whenever Jesus preached the good news, He also healed the sick: "And where he came ... they laid the sick ... and besought him ... and as many as He touched were made well ..." [Saint Mark 6:56]

Jesus' Disciples and Healing

Jesus said, "He who believes in me will also do the works that I do; and greater works than these will he do, because I go to the Father" [Saint John 14:12] and commanded them specifically to preach and "heal the sick" [Saint Matthew 10:7].

Healing and Early Christians

The first Christians followed the works of Jesus and prayed that the works of God might be revealed. Besides the healings in Jerusalem, the healing work of Philip in Samaria [Acts 8:5-8] and Paul in Ephesus and on the island of Malta are noted [Acts 19:9-12; 28:9].

Healing and the Church

The gift of healing is much different from other gifts of the Spirit mentioned in the New Testament [among them prophesy, preaching, teaching, administration, hospitality, and generosity].

The New Testament does not speak of a special gift by the Lord to an individual, but the gift of healing as a gift which the church may use and administer through its representative.

In other words, the gift of healing is not given to one man or woman, but to the Church!

Prayer and Healing

The primary emphasis is on the prayer of faith. It will give the sick the help needed; that is, the help God wants to provide.

The Laying on of Hands

The laying on of hands [incorporated into the Healing Service for those who desire] is noted in both the Old and New Testaments. Jacob is described as blessings the sons of Joseph by the laying on of hands in Genesis 48. And according to the command of the Lord, Moses put his hand on Joshua. Jesus often used the laying on of hands when he healed the sick [see St. Mark 1:41-2, St. Luke 5:13, St. Matthew 9:29, and St. John 9:6, for examples].

Jesus also told the believers to use the laying on of hands when they healed the sick. "And these signs will accompany those who believe; in my name they will cast out demons ... they will lay their hands on the sick, and they will recover." [St. Mark 17:17-18].

It should also be noted that in the evangelical church, we also use the laying on of hands at baptism, absolution, confirmation, and ordination.

Anointing with Oil

Anointing with oil may be compared to the visible means Jesus often used to evidence the accomplishment of healing, which might not be visible.

One must remember however, that the *outward* means, such as anointing with oil, *is not necessary* for healing. However, James 5:14 clearly states "Let him call the elders of the church and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord."

In the liturgy of healing, those who desire *may* receive anointing with oil by the tracing of the sign of the Cross on the forehead.

Healing and Ritual Forms

There is no prescribed ritual or exact formula which must be followed in order to receive the gift of healing. However, New Testament writings do provide for the centrality of faith and prayer, with the laying on of hands and anointing with oil. We follow the format prescribed in the *Occasional Services* accompaniment to the book of *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*.

You should remember

- Participation is <u>completely voluntary</u>.
- Requests for prayer for specific individuals not able to be present should be made to the Pastor in advance. [NOTE: permission from the individual must be obtained.]
- ◆ You may invite family and friends to the Feast Day of Saint Luke.
- Our liturgy of healing does not replace the need for everyone to keep regular appointments with medical doctors.


A Visit to the Pittsburgh Biblical Botanical Garden

Members of the Spring Thursday Morning Book Study Group read and discussed the book titled **Ark Encounter: The Making of a Creationist Theme Park** by James S. Bielo. In the second chapter called *Materializing the Bible*, Bielo mentions Pittsburgh's **Rodef Shalom Biblical Botanical Garden**. The intent of this garden, according to its website, is to "enter the Holy Land, a replica of ancient Israel." According to Bielo, "Biblical gardens aim to immerse visitors in the natural world of scripture."

On our September 4th visit to **Rodef Shalom Biblical Botanical Garden** (located on Fifth Avenue in Oakland), we experienced "the Holy Land-Ancient Israel, in a setting of a cascading waterfall, a desert, a bubbling stream, the Jordan, which meanders through the garden…" (Bielo, p. 42).

Although our visit was on a very warm day, seeing the water elements in the garden helped to cool us, at least in our thoughts! Our docent was happy to answer any questions we had. We learned that ours was the last tour of the summer. Some plants, we were told will weather the colder months while others planted in pots are taken inside to be brought out next season. This field trip deepened our appreciation for the meaning of biblical gardens and the purpose they serve.

- 1 International Day of Older Persons Remember in prayer older adults, who bring vitality and diverse gifts to communities and congregations; give thanks for their faith, wisdom, generosity and life experiences. Pray for those who live in nursing homes, facilities for memory care and assisted living, and continuing care retirement communities, that they will be valued and respected and will receive skilled care.
- **2** "Yours the soil that holds the seed, you give warmth and moisture, too. Sprouting blossoms, crops and buds, trees and plants: the season's signs that you make all things new" (*With One Voice* 727). Greet this new day with gratitude to God for the blessings of autumn fall harvests, the beauty of changing seasons and other signs of God's ceaseless creativity.
- **3** Give thanks for the 13 new ELCA missionaries who have begun their work alongside global partners in eight countries, serving as teachers, pastors, pastoral interns, program coordinators and more.
- 4 Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, renewer of the church (1181-1226) Give thanks and praise to God for saints who have gone before us and saints still in our midst, who teach and inspire us to be humble, generous, grateful and attentive children of God.
- 5 We are nourished and sustained by countless resources in creation all gifts from God, entrusted to our care. Give thanks for the gift of water, without which life cannot exist or flourish. Pray that we will exercise discipline, responsibility and generosity in how we use water, and that we will work to assure the availability of clean water for all people, everywhere.
- 6 Pray for the children of your congregation and give thanks that God has entrusted to us the opportunity and responsibility to nurture their faith and gifts and to surround them with care and grace.
- 7 Remember in prayer girls, women and people of other gender identities and expressions who suffer domestic violence. Pray that they will find care and safe shelter that support their recovery from physical, emotional and spiritual trauma. Give thanks for the work and resources available to us through the ELCA Gender Justice and Women's Empowerment program.
- **8** Ask the Spirit for guidance, wisdom and creativity as we work to grow the church, not for the sake of numbers but to spread the message of God's love and mercy for humanity and to draw upon the gifts of the many to love and serve our neighbors, here and around the world.
- 9 Pray for national leaders, diplomats, mediators and organizations working to achieve ceasefires, peace and recovery in Ukraine, Russia, Israel, the Palestinian territories, Sudan and other regions. Ask God to make us diligent bearers of hope, peace and justice in the world.
- 10 Remember in prayer refugees, immigrants and asylum-seekers who are displaced by economic and climate crises and by conflict and persecution. Ask God to protect them as they seek safe, welcoming places where they can settle and rebuild their lives.
- 11 "When I look at your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars that you have established; what are humans that you are mindful of them, mortals that you care for them?" (Psalm 8:3-4). Give thanks and praise to God, who showers love and attention on us no matter how complicated our lives are or how insignificant we feel.
- 12 Pray that we might discern and avoid the false teaching of Christian nationalism, which divides us and uses Christ's name to place us above others, claiming privilege and God's favor. Ask the Spirit to stir in us a desire and commitment to love, uplift and serve our neighbors without bias.
- 13 Ask God to help us keep our priorities straight, that we might share the good news of Jesus Christ and trust in the promise of eternal life.
- 14 Indigenous Peoples' Day "We join states, cities and towns across the country to celebrate Indigenous Peoples Day in place of Columbus Day and honor the people whose lands we walk, whose Indigenous voices have always been spoken here and who share their gifts and contributions throughout our society" (Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton, Indigenous Peoples' Day statement). Pray that, in our relations with Indigenous neighbors and children of God, we will not waver in our commitment to repentance, reconciliation, healing and unity.
- 15 "Christ has no body now but mine. He prays in me, works in me, looks through my eyes, speaks through my words, works through my hands, walks with my feet and loves with my heart" (St. Teresa of Avila, 1515-1582). Pray for God to work through every aspect of our life that we might give witness to God's boundless love and mercy.

- 16 World Food Day The theme for World Food Day 2024 is "Right to Foods for a Better Life and a Better Future." Pray that all people will have adequate access to food that is safe and healthy. Give thanks for the work and advocacy of ELCA World Hunger, Lutheran Disaster Response and partner organizations to address the causes of hunger and improve food security.
- 17 "The Bible is a remarkable fountain: The more one draws and drinks of it, the more it stimulates thirst" (Martin Luther, 1483-1546). Let us resolve to spend more time studying and discussing Scripture so that we might grow in our understanding of God and connect our faith and the gospel with daily life.
- 18 The message of the Old Testament prophet Micah is crucial for our world today: "What does the Lord require of you but to do justice and to love kindness and to walk humbly with your God?" (Micah 6:8). Pray that we will humble ourselves and serve our neighbors who suffer poverty, hunger and exclusion.
- 19 Lift up in prayer youth and family ministry leaders who nurture the faith of young people, reassure them of God's presence and grace, and affirm their value as members of our faith communities. Give thanks for the work, resources and support of ELCA Youth Ministry, the ELCA Youth Gathering and the ELCA Youth Ministry Network.
- 20 Ask the Spirit to deepen our understanding of our identity and purpose as baptized children of God, called and equipped to live with gratitude and joy, to share the life-giving news of Jesus Christ and to work for justice and peace.
- 21 Give thanks and praise to our Creator, who is the source of bountiful fall harvests and sustains us in body and spirit.
- 22 Pray for an end to gun-related deaths and injuries and to the trauma, grief, anxiety and anguish they spread through our communities and nation. Ask God to help us honor the gift of life and the well-being of all people through bold advocacy to reduce gun violence.
- 23 Pray for ministries and organizations that help us welcome, resettle and accompany immigrants, asylum-seekers and refugees with dignity and hope, including Lutheran Disaster Response, ELCA World Hunger, AMMPARO Migrant Ministry, Global Refuge and Lutheran Services in America.
- **24** "When they call to me, I will answer them; I will be with them in trouble; I will rescue them and honor them" (Psalm 91:15). God is our everpresent refuge and fortress. Let our prayers and songs proclaim unceasing thanks and praise to God!
- 25 Pray for the ministry of the Evangelical Lutheran Education Association, which supports the 1,300 ELCA congregations and 17,000 staff offering weekday schools and early childhood education programs.
- 26 Reflect on the people around you who might hunger for a friendly word or some indication that they are loved and not forgotten. Include them in your prayers and reach out to them.
- 27 Reformation Sunday Praise God for being patient with us through the challenges and changes of being the church and discerning God's truth.
- 28 Pray that the Spirit will work through the traditions, rites and practices of the church, which, evolving over time and from generation to generation, affirm God's saving grace and inspire us to share it.
- 29 Lament that we sin and fall short of the glory and expectations of God, then shout prayers of thanksgiving and joy that we are forgiven, freed and saved by the gift of God's grace.
- **30** Throughout history God has acted with steadfast love, forgiveness and concern for humankind. Alleluia, thanks be to God!
- **31** Reformation Day Give thanks for the legacy of Martin Luther and other reformers who demanded that the theology and practices of the church be faithful to God's word and the good news of Jesus Christ. Pray that we will never stop reflecting on Scripture or the gospel message, and that our ministries and faith communities might best respond to their call to do God's work in the world.
