Thanks be to God for our 100th Year!

"... you are dust, and to dust you shall return." -Genesis 3:19

See the morning sun ascending, radiant in the eastern sky; hear the angel voices blending in their praise to God on high! Alleluia! Alleluia! Glory be to God on high! These soaring words are from the opening hymn sung on my wedding day. Barbara and I were married in Lent on March 16, 1991.

When love is torn and trust betrayed, pray strength to love till torments fade, till lovers keep no score of wrong, but hear through pain love's Easter song. These words are from the second hymn at our wedding. They're a confession of sin. All newlyweds go the way of Adam and Eve. They sin against God and each other. When we sang these words at our wedding, we were saying we would fall, but also that God would forgive. We were proclaiming God's new beginnings.

Easter falls on April 20 this year. In 1991, it fell on March 31. The 2nd Sunday of Lent this year is March 16, marking for me 34 years of sharing life with Barbara; 34 years of sinning, forgiving, hearing love's Easter song, and looking ahead in hope. It's true we are dust and to dust we shall return, but God in Christ will raise us from the dust of death to everlasting life.

Return to God on Ash Wednesday. Attend all our Lenten season liturgies this year. Confess sin; look ahead in hope. On Sunday, March 16, join the church in this prayer: God of the covenant, in the mystery of the cross you promise everlasting life to the world. Gather all peoples into your arms, and shelter us with your mercy, that we may rejoice in the life we share in your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God.

We are loved; we are forgiven; no sin is too great for Christ to forgive. See the morning sun ascending during this Lenten season; hear through pain love's Easter song. New beginnings are possible; they happen every Sunday in church. No testing happens without God giving us a way out. Jesus Christ is our way out; the way forward. A blessed Lent to all. Best of all, God is with us. There is a life that truly is life—life with God; life lived by forgiveness; grace; hope; starting over.

Ash Wednesday: Our Lenten wake-up call

MONDAY NIGHT BIBLE STUDY


The Gospel of Mark

The Importance of the role of an Acolyte/Crucifer



The acolyte/crucifer ministry has its roots in the Old Testament, where young Samuel is seen assisting Eli in the temple, and Elisha is seen assisting Elijah the Prophet. Acolytes serve as a companion to the pastor, performing a number of important duties before, during and at the close of the worship service. The word "acolyte" is derived from the Greek word *acolytos*, meaning companion, attendant or helper.

The responsibilities of an acolyte include leading the entrance, or processional, and exit, or recessional, helping to prepare and distribute the Eucharist, helping during special services throughout the year and preparing the church for worship as they light the altar candles.

Acolytes will find their perspective on worship altered dramatically. For example, did you know that the altar is the symbol of the meeting between God and His people and a place of God's action? Bowing before the altar is an act of reverence and respect for the Lord. The altar candles are also symbolic. The right side is the "Epistle" side, and is lit first. The left side of the altar is the "Gospel" side. The Paschal candle is the large decorative candle used during Easter to show the presence of the risen Christ among His people. It is also, therefore, used at baptisms and funerals as a sign of the Christian's dying and rising with Christ.

Together with the clergy, choir, band, lay ministers and lay readers, acolytes are leaders of the liturgy. The acolyte's role is to create the right space and mood for worship. They are visible leaders and, as such, can help other people to follow along with the service. The congregation depends on acolytes and appreciates this special ministry. This is why acolytes take their responsibility seriously and dress and act accordingly.

But while being an acolyte is a big responsibility, it's also a joyous experience. Acolyting is a ministry that is especially suitable for young people. As youth begin to transition from childhood into adulthood, the church asks them to begin taking on new and greater responsibilities in the life of the congregation. Acolyting is a very spiritually-fulfilling opportunity, and all eligible youth are encouraged to participate. The acolytes serve based on a rotation from a list of active acolytes and depending on the number of youth available to acolyte for each style of service they serve once a month or so. The acolytes serve during the service time their family prefers.

Christ is our greatest example of being a servant to others, from what He taught and how He lived. Developing a servant heart is one way each of us can work on being more Christ-like. God gives believers of every age the means to accomplish his or her called upon duty by filling them with the Holy Spirit.

The Transfiguration of Our Lord

Sunday, March 2, 2025 [The Last Sunday after the Epiphany]

If you have ever struggled with a novel that takes you through countless plot twists and turns, and you have skipped ahead to read the final chapter in order to see more clearly where you are going, then you have a sense of how the Transfiguration works in the Gospel, and how Transfiguration Sunday works in the church's year of grace.

The Transfiguration of our Lord is not only the last of the manifestations [epiphanies] of Christ which we encounter on the Sundays after the Epiphany, it also offers a glimpse of the resurrected Christ in His glory. Peter and the disciples objected to His suffering and dying, to this turn in the plot of Jesus' life [as they perceived it], but now, at the Transfiguration, they see what is to become of Him.

In addition, this glimpse of the final chapter of Jesus' life will be our guide through the twists and turns of the wilderness of Lent, where we will end our journey, with the disciples, at the tree of life.

The Transfiguration is not only the story of Christ's life, it is also the story of our life as well, for "if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his" [Saint Paul].

Transfiguration Sunday is also the day we return the Palm branches from last year so that they may be imposed on Ash Wednesday.

Full participation in the Eucharistic life of the Church is a milestone in a young person's life for "at the table of our Lord Jesus Christ, God nourishes faith, forgives sin, and calls us to be witnesses to the Gospel."

Nurturing Faith in the Home



It is in home that we ought truly to be able to be ourselves, because it is in the home that we sense our rootedness. And, therefore, we ought to be able to admit our failures, celebrate our joys, acknowledge our despair, and experience illness and even death.

It is in the home that we have the daily experiences of life — not text book examples — for the growing recognition of God at work in our own life and in and through the lives of others.

And therefore, the home should be a place of intentional, planned study and reflection in which we can articulate and experience faith and daily life.

For children especially, home is their primary world. And it is from the interactions in this setting, that the primary life stance of the child develops. While researchers vary in the exact age, they all agree that the major developmental tasks and primary values are established in the preschool years.

Without a doubt, it is in the home that the basic sense of love and trust are developed.

7 Goals For Nurturing Faith In The Home

- 1. Each person will be encouraged to know her/himself as a child of God who is forgiven and saved by the death of Jesus Christ and daily strengthened by the Holy Spirit.
- 2. We will regularly study the Scriptures and seek to apply this good news to our daily life.
- 3. We will learn to recognize and experience the love of God in members of our household. We will honor, love, and respect each member of our home.
- 4. We will grow in faith and relationship to one another as we learn to trust, resolve conflicts, forgive, work, and play together.
- 5. We will be a home of prayer and praise.
- 6. We will experience and care for our neighborhood and world. We will be advocates and workers for ethnic appreciation and solidarity, peace, justice, and the environment.
- 7. We will be willing, able and eager to share the good news of Jesus Christ.

Our faith journey is never-ending, but we do go it alone. We are called and set in families of God.

Images of Lent

The ashes of Ash Wednesday remind us that we are repenting in order to follow Jesus. So, what does God want from us? The answer comes in our Lenten Bible readings.

God wants more than our presence in worship. Lent is an invitation to a fast, but the kind God wants is not merely an abstention from gluttony. Our fasting is to be a dedicated striving aimed at achieving justice for all God's children.

The prophet Isaiah told people they missed the point of repentance by their dramatic focus on personal suffering. Our focus should be on what's truly important: those who are poor, oppressed, hungry, and homeless. Sacrificing for others is a counter-cultural indictment of things the way they are.

The ashes of Lent remind us of our call to be servants, and lead us also to acknowledge that, no matter how hard we try, we cannot save ourselves.

In truth, the discipline of keeping Lent is intended to clear away what is extra so that we might focus on what is essential: our relationship with God. Lent invites us to fast because we do not live by bread alone. Lent calls us to give offerings in response to what God gives us in Christ. Lent reminds us to pray, not to get something from God, but because God is God and worthy of our prayers of thanksgiving.

Those who bear the cross know this truth. It is the truth we must not forget even though so much of the world is swept up in glib psychology. Isaiah knew the temptation to ignore the truth, and it is hard to resist that temptation, and difficult to do God's will, and painful to work for justice. But the faithful will follow God, empowered by their baptism, and marked with the cross of Christ.

How to prepare for fasting...

Genuine, Spirit-filled fasting calls for intentional preparation. Such fasting calls for the following as a minimum:

- Examine your motives (Isa. 58:3-7)
- Surrender your life fully to Jesus Christ as your Lord and Savior (Rom. 12:1-2)
- Ask God to reveal your sins to you (Ps. 19:12)
- Confess your sins (1 John 1:9)
- Seek forgiveness from those you have offended (Mark 11:25; Luke 17:3-4)
- Make restitution as the Holy Spirit leads (Matt. 5:23 -26)
- Ask God to fill you with His Holy Spirit (Eph. 5:18)
- consult with your physician before beginning a fast of any length.

What to do while fasting...

- •Pray (Dan. 9:3; Acts 14:23);
- •Meditate on the Word of God (Ps. 1:1-2; Col. 3:16).
- •Meditate on the attributes of God: love, grace, wisdom, compassion, sovereignty (Ps. 48:9, 10; 103:1-13).
- •Expect God to bless you and reveal Himself to you (Heb. 11:6).
- •Do not underestimate spiritual opposition (Gal. 5:16, 17)
- •Refuse to yield to your worldly nature (Rom. 12:1-2).
- •Exhibit an attitude of joy (Zech. 8:19; Matt, 6:17,18).

2025 Lenten Service Project Gift Card and Bedding Drive for Local Refugees Ash Wednesday (March 5) - Easter Sunday (April 20)

Global Refuge (Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service) is currently facing challenges due to federal funding changes. Support for refugees <u>already lawfully resettled</u> in the United States has been reduced, making necessary charitable giving from churches.

Funding for refugees has been frozen amid adjustments in national priorities. Many individuals are in need of humanitarian support. The dislocation of people is a global issue requiring action at local levels. Establishing a Church: The Early Years

Throughout 2025 we are sharing the history of our congregation. This month's article is based on the work of Dr. Jean Hunter, a former member and retired History Professor at Duquesne University and archival materials of our church.

Key Events and Dates

1924

• The Liberty Tunnel opens as the then-longest vehicular tunnel in the U.S. The South Hills experiences rapid development and huge population growth.

1925

- First church service held in Washington School 15 worshippers are present.
- Sunday School began with 3 classes.
- First congregational meetings held to organize the church and adopt the name: Mt. Lebanon United Lutheran.
- Property was purchased at Academy Avenue and Washington Road.
- Reverend Harvey E. Harman was installed as the Senior Pastor.
- In October the Pittsburgh Pirates defeat the Washington Senators in the World Series.

1926

- Pastor Harman died at age 51 on May 2 after a short illness.
- Pastor Elbert E, Oney was installed as pastor on August 8.
- The congregation voted to build a sanctuary "...at a cost of no more than \$45,000".

1927

- Ground is broken for the first unit on Academy Avenue
- Charles Lindbergh flew the first solo transatlantic New York-Paris nonstop flight.
- The Congregation worshipped for the first time in the basement of the new building. Only the education unit was built at this point.
- The Pirates win the pennant but lose to the Yankees in the World Series.

1929

All participants will pray at home or in the sanctuary during office hours. Participation of homebound and out-of-town members is encouraged.

God has appointed prayer for conferring blessings we all need, whether spiritual or temporal, and has ordained prayer as a joyous occasion of divine-human fellowship.

Please join fellow members in these great hours of prayer. Scripture exhorts us to "pray without ceasing." The Holy Week vigil is a way we participate in the unceasing prayers of the one, holy, catholic, and apostolic church.
