God gives grace to the humble. –James 5:6

In Mark 5, Jesus came to the home of a gravely ill girl. He took her by the hand and said, "Talitha cum," which means, "Little girl, get up." She did; she began to walk; her parents were overcome with amazement. In his novel, Of Time and the River, Thomas Wolfe describes a man in this way...

He had been a nameless atom in the great family of earth, a single unknown thread in the huge warp of fate and chance that weaves our lives together and because of this he had been the richest man that ever lived.

Wolfe speaks of the 'common man'; the innumerable cogs in the wheel of life that make life what it is. Cogs are minor, but necessary for life. Scripture and literature are rife with accounts of them finally receiving at last dignity, recognition, appreciation, and love.

The little girl was a cog of sorts. We don't know what became of her after Jesus raised her up, but there's no need for any speculation. What was important for the gospel writer, Mark, was to have us know Jesus gave grace to her. Psalm 147:7 says, "The Lord lifts up the downtrodden; he casts the wicked to the ground. Mary says in her Magnificat, "He has filled the hungry with good things." God has a heart for cogs.

I worry about bucket lists; they're always about ourselves; our desire to visit one more place, see one more thing, hike one more trail, swim one more ocean, buy one more home in a homeless world. Why are our bucket lists nearly always self-centered? God is not found on the lists of many. Our 100th year is a time to reexamine our buckets. It's not too late for us to become nameless atoms in the great family of earth, single unknown threads in the huge warp that weaves our lives together and because of this the richest persons who've ever lived.




THE BOOK OF PSALMS

FROM THE STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

Stewards of Relationships You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor. -Exodus 20:16

Even if you've never had to testify in court, a thousand TV shows have made you familiar with the question, "Do you swear to tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth?" Why not just make people swear to tell the truth? Or make them promise not to lie? Any parent who has ever had to interrogate a child about a broken cookie jar or a scuffle over a toy knows the answer. There are plenty of ways to try to get out of trouble without technically lying. You tell just enough of the truth to skate on by.

We often play the game of seeing how close we can get to sinning without technically going over the line.

But in our heart of hearts we know that this is not what God intended when He gave us the commandments. He's not giving us a merely negative rule and challenging us to just barely stay away from this or that. There is much more to each commandment than a prohibition. We shouldn't just avoid murdering people — we should be of service to our neighbor.

For each negative prohibition in the commandments there is a positive good that we are to cherish and protect. In the Eighth Commandment, that gift is the reputation of our neighbor and our relationship with him:

You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor.

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation, but defend him, speak well of him, and explain everything in the kindest way.

Your relationship with your family members (who are your nearest neighbors), the other members of your congregation, your coworkers and your friends is one of the most precious gifts you have been given. You need to exercise good stewardship with this gift just as much as you need to exercise good stewardship with your life, resources, time and income. This is an especially fragile gift because it's easy to ruin a relationship with slander and talking behind someone's back.

But speaking well of your neighbor in Christian love is absolutely free; it costs you nothing, yet it pays you great dividends. If you find this challenging at times, if you are tempted to speak ill of others, just remember that this other person is also a beloved child of God for whom your Lord Jesus suffered and died. Your Lord Jesus loves you both.



Mt. Lebanon Lutheran Campus Grounds Renewal Project is Underway

As our congregation begins its next 100 years of its history, we are taking steps to enhance our grounds on the Washington Road facing side of our campus. Our appearance should be welcoming, safe, and ensure the long-term viability of our building. Plans are actively underway to refresh our "front door" to the community.

We recently removed one dead tree and one diseased tree on the northern portion of the church grounds. These posed potential risks to vehicular traffic as well as the many school children, dog walkers, joggers, and other pedestrians along Washington Road. Additionally, three trees in front of the Education wing were harvested. The pin oaks continued to grow up and out into the power lines. Also, their leaves do not disintegrate which create maintenance issues, impact the roof, and result in untenable insurance implications.

New trees will be planted as well as other features to beautify our property. A committee of church members will be reviewing native tree species that are approved for Mt. Lebanon and the Pittsburgh region. These trees will enhance our property, address safety and other concerns, and reflect environmental stewardship.

Full participation in the Eucharistic life of the Church is a milestone in a young person's life for "at the table of our Lord Jesus Christ, God nourishes faith, forgives sin, and calls us to be witnesses to the Gospel."

However, it was over 30 years ago that the Lutheran Church in America separated "confirmation" and the reception of Holy Communion. Since that time, congregations have continued to lower the age at which children are instructed and invited to commune.





What is confirmation?

August 11, 2014

"What's up with confirmation? What happens during confirmation and why do we have it?" – *Braden Malme, Arlington, Wash.*

Anne: You are not alone in asking this question! Many people, including pastors, wonder what the point of confirmation is. Something that helps me is to call it Affirmation of Baptism, which is a much more descriptive name for what we're doing. Basically, it's an opportunity for people to affirm for themselves the promises that their parents, sponsors and congregation made for them at their baptism. At baptism, parents make this promise: "... to live with them among God's faithful people, bring them to the word of God and the holy supper, teach them the Lord's Prayer, the Creed and the Ten Commandments, place in their hands the holy Scriptures, and nurture them in faith and prayer, so that your children may learn to trust God, proclaim Christ through word and deed, care for others and the world God made, and work for justice and peace."

At their affirmation of baptism, confirmands are asked to make this promise for themselves: "...to live among God's faithful people, to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's Supper, to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, to serve all people, following the example of Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth." The process of preparing people to affirm these promises can take many forms, including classes and increased involvement in congregational life. The process of confirmation takes many forms and varies from congregation to congregation, but the end goal is the same: to prepare people to boldly and confidently make those promises, affirm their baptisms and continue to live out their faith in the church.

<u>Kelly:</u> While confirmation is a time-honored rite of passage in our Lutheran tradition, we tend to treat confirmation like the finish line when it is really more like the starting gate.

- 3 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assemblies of the Northeastern Minnesota, Northwest Intermountain and Southwestern Texas synods, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and inspire them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders and encourage one another to proclaim the gospel and serve our neighbors in need.
- 4 "[Peter] said to [Jesus], 'Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my sheep'" (John 21:17). Ask God to help us align our expressions of faith and love for God with how we respect, love and care for our neighbors in need and our siblings in Christ.
- 5 Thank God for the ELCA's special relationship with the United Church of Christ, a full communion partner since 1997. Pray for the church, its members and its leaders, that together we will find strength and resources for the work of sharing the gospel and serving our neighbor.
- **6** Pray that compassion and concern for the well-being of people and communities will guide leaders and governments to work diligently for peace, reconciliation, justice and mutual respect.
- 7 Sing praises and give thanks to God for being our strength in *all* circumstances and for attending to our need for help, renewal and encouragement.
- **8** Pray for Lutheran Disaster Response and its collaborations with other disaster relief organizations domestic, international and ecumenical to provide physical, emotional and spiritual care for people affected by disasters and to support them during short- and long-term recovery efforts.
- 9 "In our worldwide task of caring for the hungry and despairing, in the harvests we are sharing, God's will is done" (WOV 760). Pray for the Spirit to give us a clear understanding of God's will and ways, that our concern and love for our neighbors in need will not be hindered by bias, suspicion or judgement.
- 10 Remember in prayer students at universities, colleges and seminaries as they prepare for exams and graduation, that they will find comfort in times of stress, encouragement when they feel uncertain and renewed hope for what lies ahead of them in their vocational journeys.
- 11 Mother's Day Pray for mothers, stepmothers, foster mothers and expectant mothers. Pray for women who struggle with parenting, who are trying to conceive or who cannot bear children of their own but serve as loving and faithful adults in the lives of children and youth.
- 12 Praise God for the boundless love and forgiveness we have in Jesus Christ and the gift of eternal life that stirs hope, joy and gratitude in us. Pray for the Spirit to inspire and equip us to share this good news far and wide.
- 13 The ELCA walks with more than 80 companion churches around the world to participate in God's work of service, reconciliation and proclaiming the gospel. Praise God for what we accomplish together and for the faith, hospitality, enthusiasm and wisdom of companion churches that energize our own leaders and congregations.
- 14 Give thanks for ELCA Campus Ministry and the Lutheran Campus Ministry Network (LuMin), which serve students, faculty, staff and others on college and university campuses and which bear witness to God's abundant grace through worship, study, fellowship, service and pastoral care.
- 15 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assemblies of the Northern Great Lakes and Texas-Louisiana Gulf Coast synods, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and inspire them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders and encourage one another to proclaim the gospel and serve our neighbors in need.
- 16 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assemblies of the Northwest Washington, Pacifica, Saint Paul Area and Southeast Michigan synods, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and inspire them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders and encourage one another to proclaim the gospel and serve our neighbors in need.


